### **Background to the National Church Life Survey**

In late 2016, more than a quarter of a million church-going Australians took part in the National Church Life Survey (NCLS) by completing a questionnaire on their faith, their involvement in church life, and a variety of other topics. These people came from over 3,000 parishes and local congregations representing more than 20 denominations and independent churches across the country.

Catholic parishes have participated in the last four National Church Life Surveys, in 2001, 2006, 2011 and 2016. A parallel project, the Catholic Church Life Survey (CCLS), was conducted in 1996.

#### The national random sample

This report is based on questionnaires completed by Mass attenders in a national random sample of 193 parishes, selected so as to ensure there was a representative sample of parishes from each diocese. Once the national sample had been chosen, all other parishes were invited to take part in the survey, and 162 did so, meaning that a total of 355 Catholic parishes participated in the 2016 survey. These additional parishes received a report on their results, but as they are not part of the statistical sample their results are not included here.

Since the national random sample is statistically representative of all Catholic Church attenders in Australia, the findings of the survey can confidently be regarded as applying, with a high level of probability, to the whole Church in Australia.

#### Weighting

Because the structure of the sample does not exactly match that of the dioceses from which it comes, the results have been modified by applying a corrective 'weight' to each diocese, so that they better reflect the distribution of Mass-attending Catholics across Australia.

#### How the survey was conducted

All people aged 15 and over at Mass (or, in some places, services in the absence of a priest) on the day of the survey were invited to complete a questionnaire. The total number of completed questionnaires received from the parishes in the national sample was around 37,350.

In addition to the adult questionnaire, parishes could order optional questionnaires for children aged 8 to 14 years, a revised and shorter version of the adult survey. In total, 2,164 children completed the children's survey. However, results from the children's survey are not included in this report.

#### **Questionnaire versions**

This extremely large sample meant that the project could investigate a wide variety of topics without making questionnaires unduly long. This was done by using a number of different versions of the questionnaire, distributed at random to the people at Mass on the Sunday of the survey. Questionnaire AC, which formed the basis of the report prepared for each parish, was completed by 67 per cent of respondents in each parish, while the remaining 33 per cent of respondents completed one of 20 other versions, each dealing with a different topic. Most of these versions were distributed to attenders of all denominations but two, Questionnaires S3 and X, were designed for use only in Catholic parishes.

The questions commissioned by the National Catholic Education Commission were included in Questionnaire S3, which was completed by 2,591 attenders.

#### A note on statistical significance

Each cross-tabulation in this report is marked as significant or not significant and the level of significance is also indicated.

To say that a result is statistically significant is to say that it is highly probable that the result shows an actual difference, not one that has arisen by chance. For example, if in a sample we find that 60 per cent of men and 40 per cent of women believe Statement A is true, this can either be due to chance factors which determined the make-up of our sample, or to an actual difference between what men and women believe. A statistically significant result is one where the likelihood of the result arising by chance is below a specified level of probability.

Statistical significance is usually reported at 0.05, 0.01 or 0.001 level, meaning that there is a less than five in one hundred chance, one in a hundred chance, or one in a thousand chance,

respectively, that the result under discussion has arisen by chance. In the example above, a 0.001 level of statistical significance means that there is less than one chance in a thousand that the observed difference between men and women has arisen by chance. In other words, the observed difference is highly likely to reflect a real difference in what men and women believe.

However, it is important to note that saying a result is statistically significant is not the same as saying it is important. It may be that the difference between men and women in their belief about Statement A is not at all important or that it is not substantial. The importance of a result cannot be determined statistically. Rather, it is a matter for the judgement of those interpreting the results.

#### **Non-Catholic attenders**

Not all Mass attenders in Catholic parishes are Catholics. About 2.6 per cent of Questionnaire S3 respondents were not Catholic.

### Analysis of the data – notes on the NCEC commissioned questions

#### 1. Independent and dependent variables

An independent variable is one that might to some extent predict how survey respondents respond to another variable, known as the *dependent* variable. For this reason, independent variables are sometimes called *predictor* variables.

Most demographic variables, such as age, sex and level of education, can be regarded as independent variables. For example, does the survey data show that a male respondent aged in his 70s who has had no post-secondary education and a young adult female with a post-graduate degree are likely to respond differently to a particular survey question?

Church involvement questions can also be treated as independent variables. For example, does someone who goes to Mass every Sunday, holds a leadership role in the parish, and is a generous financial donor to the parish respond to survey questions differently from someone who rarely goes to Mass, is not involved in the parish, and does not contribute financially to the parish?

Most questions commissioned in the National Church Life Survey by Conference agencies and other Catholic organisations are dependent variables. Commissioning agencies are interested in knowing the extent to which various demographic and parish involvement variables predict the responses of survey respondents to the question they have commissioned. For example:

- The Truth Justice and Healing Council wanted to know about the attitudes of Mass attenders to the clergy sexual abuse crisis and the extent to which demographic and church involvement questions influence their attitudes (Qns 39 to 45 in Questionnaire S3).
- Catholic Earthcare wanted to know how Mass attenders' demographic and characteristics
  influence their knowledge of Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudato Si'* and whether they believe
  Christians have a responsibility to actively care for the environment (Qns 46 to 49).
- The National Liturgical Council wanted to know whether those same independent variables predict Mass attenders' attitudes to the 2011 English version of the text of the Mass (Qns 50 and 51).

Two of the questions (Qns 56 & 59) commissioned by the NCEC are clearly dependent variables; the issue of interest is the extent to which responses to these questions vary according to the characteristics of the person responding to them.

The matter is not so clear-cut in relation to Questions 57 and 58. They are basically demographic questions: number of children, age of those children, and the type of primary and secondary schools attended by those children. As *independent* variables, they provide answers to the questions 'to what extent does the number of children a Mass attender has, the age of those children, and the type of school they attend influence that attender's responses to the questions about the main reasons for choosing a primary and secondary schools or about not choosing a Catholic primary or secondary school?'

However, it is also possible to treat those questions as *dependent* variables. In other words, to ask questions such as 'Is the number of children a Mass attender has related to their age, sex, state of residence, level of education, spouse's religion, frequency of Mass attendance, and the

like?' Similarly, is the type of school they send their children to influenced by demographic and parish involvement variables?

In this report, in line with the convention of reporting commissioned questions, we present results for number of children and type of school attended by the children as *dependent* variables. However, we also present results for the number of children a Mass attender has, the age of the oldest of those children, and the type of school the children attend as *independent* variables.

#### 2. Questions 56 and 59

The complexity of the questions about reasons for choosing a school (Qn 56) and for not choosing a Catholic school (Qn 59) is due to the fact that they both have two dimensions (primary and secondary) and multiple response options (16 in the case of Qn 56, and 14 for Qn 59). Respondents were asked to answer both questions by selecting up to three of the most important factors for them in relation to both primary and secondary schools, a maximum of six responses per respondent. This introduces a limitation in that at least some respondents would have been forced to omit factors, other than their first three choices for primary and for secondary, that they also considered to be important. Ideally, it would have been better to ask respondents to score every option from, for example, 'not important' to 'very important', but this would have required 32 and 28 responses respectively from each respondent rather than a maximum of six for each question, adding to the time taken to complete the questionnaire and resulting in a much higher fee charged by NCLS. (The fee would have increased because every option would then have been treated as a separate question, instead of the whole group being treated as one question. NCLS charges according to the number of questions.)

A further problem arises with Qn 59, in that it applied to only those respondents with children who had chosen not to send one or more of them to a Catholic school, at least for part of their education. Only 333 and 347 Mass attenders responded to this question in relation to primary and secondary schools respectively. The most commonly selected reasons were high school fees, inconvenient location, and 'some other reason'. All the other response options attracted very few responses: fewer than 30 in almost every case, not enough to reliably further investigate by cross-tabulating with the demographic and other independent variables.

What might this 'some other reason' be? If it was one or two specific reasons that had been overlooked in compiling the list of response options, we would probably have gained some clues to their nature in the cross-tabulations. For example, if there had been a statistically significant relationship between 'some other reason' and age or education, we would have been able to conclude that the 'other reason' applied differently to different age groups or to people of different educational levels. In fact, there were very few statistically significant relationships, and these were relatively weak, the strongest being the relationships with the respondents' birthplace and that of their parents.

## **Demographic profile of respondents to Questionnaire S3**

Unweighted (actual) figures - All responses

Questionnaire S3 completed by 2,591 respondents in national random sample parishes.

NOTE: Not all respondents to Questionnaire S3 answered every question. Older people (those aged 60 and over) were over-represented among non-respondents. Statistical tests show the effect of this non-response on the results reported here to be negligible.



Note that the seven responses chosen most frequently for primary schools were also the most frequently chosen for secondary schools, although there were small differences in the rank order of the seven options. (See numbers in red in the table above.)

There is very little change in these figures if respondents without children are removed from the analysis.

When only the 513 respondents with pre-school children or children currently at school are included, percentages relating to choice of primary school change slightly but the rank order is almost unchanged, except for academic reputation and caring/nurturing environment swapping places. The same is true for choices of secondary school, except that the only change in the rank order is that support for additional learning needs swaps places with caring and nurturing environment.






